

On February 15th 2022, the Ministry of Children, Community, and Social Services (MCCSS) updated their directives around activity restrictions. This updated document will outline those changes for visitors, people who use our services, and employees of Christian Horizons.

VISITS ESSENTIAL VISITOR An essential visitor is generally a person who: • Performs essential services to support the ongoing operation of a service agency (including a contractor); and/or • Considered necessary to maintain the health, wellness and safety, or any applicable legal rights, of a congregate living resident. An essential visitor may include but is not limited to the following: • A parent/guardian • Social service workers (e.g., child welfare workers, day program operators etc.),	 Essential Visits – Permitted Non-Essential Visits - (as per the definition) can resume following capacity guidelines on February 21st, 2022. Brief Physical Contact (e.g., a hug) is permitted. Scheduling A Visit Essential visitors do not need to schedule a visit. Non-essential visitors always need to schedule a visit. Number of visitors is limited to the guidance in the Re-Opening Ontario Act or the number of people that can be accommodated and maintain physical distancing, whichever is the smaller number. Only the employee supervising a visit needs to be counted towards the social gathering limits. All non-essential visits are to be supervised by service provider employees. OVERNIGHT ABSENCES		
An essential overnight absence (e.g., to a family home) considered necessary to maintain the health, wellness and safety, or any applicable legal rights, of a resident. GENERAL OVERNIGHT ABSENCES A general overnight absence is any absences that does not meet the definition of an essential overnight absence.	 Essential Overnight Absence - Permitted General Overnight Absence - (as per the definition) can resume following capacity guidelines on February 21st, 2022. If the person using services is fully vaccinated against COVID-19, they will only need to pass active screening on their return from the overnight absence. If the person using services is NOT fully vaccinated, additional precautions will be required for 10 days following their return or after receiving a negative PCR test for COVID-19, whichever comes first. 	Suspended

NEW ADMISSIONS		
New Admission/Transfer	A new admission/transfer must undergo active screening for COVID-19 signs and symptoms. • This is the ONLY requirement for a fully immunized person. A new admission who is not fully immunized must follow additional precautions until they receive a negative result on a COVID-19 PCR test OR 10 days has passed: • Monitor for symptoms. • Avoid using common areas; however, if a common area cannot be avoided, the person must use a medical (surgical/procedure) mask if tolerated. • Limit contact with other residents. • Only participate in group activities if physical distancing is maintained (i.e., 2 metres) and a medical (surgical/procedure) mask is used for the duration of the activity. • Resources to help with new admissions are available in the U-drive under current OLT resources.	Suspended
CHRISTIAN HORIZONS ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY GUIDELINES		
Use of Masks for Employees	Masks are NOT part of universal (at all times) precautions in all Christian Horizons locations. Some support locations may continue to require the use of masks, refer to your local leadership team and the directions outlined in the PPE FAQ for more details.	Follow PPE requirements for Outbreak
Use of Eye Protection for Employees	The use of eye protection is no longer required when providing supports within 2 metres of a person using services. • Eye protection is still an important and required component of PPE when mixing/diluting cleaning	Follow PPE requirements for Outbreaks
